Our 2019 fall edition of the Newsletter requested nominations be submitted for the 2020 Distinguished Alumni Award and announced the Scholarship Offerings for 2020. The KBHSAA Board held its annual holiday gathering at Baker Street in early December, and before we knew it, the month of December had rushed by. The seniors and the DAA honorees we did not get to meet at the DAA Banquet this year will be invited guests for next year's event.
